Comments from POG team:

EYE Report

The 2014 EYE Retreat was held Saturday, July 26th to Saturday, August 2nd. A total of 37 participants attended, including our group leaders. States represented included Connecticut, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia. Participants were housed on the campus of The Governor Morehead School and part of the daily programming was also held on the campus. Other programming was held on the campus of North Carolina State University. The total operating budget for 2014 was roughly \$7,000.00. Also this year, the EYE

Retreat launched its new website at [www.eyeretreat.org](http://www.eyeretreat.org). The EYE Retreat continues to be the only college transition program planned, operated, and evaluated solely by those with visual impairments in the eastern United States.

The programming for 2014 differed from previous years in that a mock class was taught on a specific topic (disability history and advocacy) and homework assignments were required of all participants as one would expect to find in a real college course. Additionally, participants were required to eat off campus for dinner twice during the week in small groups. This required them to arrange transportation, balance a food budget, and manage time to complete homework. Finally, they were provided additional off campus time each evening and during the day Friday to explore the City of Raleigh as a way of encouraging travel skills, independence, and decision making.

Other programming during the week included sessions on time management, careers, note taking, advocacy, roommates, cooking, chair yoga, self-defense, and goal ball. The EYE Retreat again partnered with the Rehabilitation Center for the Blind to host some of its college prep students during select activities and also attended the annual dance at the end of the week.

At the conclusion of the week, it was decided that an advisory board would be created in order to advise the leadership team on matters of programming and policy. This advisory board is in the process of updating the EYE Retreat policy manual, developing a strategic plan, and planning for 2015. The board recommended two educational tracks for 2015 with one being dedicated to careers and the other being the continuation of college preparation. The board further recommended that in 2016 or 2017 a two week program be considered.

Finally, the board suggested yearlong programming to include monthly conference calls on specific topics of interest and possibly a mid-year winter mini-retreat.

Applications for the 2015 EYE Retreat will be available starting January 1, 2015. Staff applications will be available starting November 1, 2014. The dates for the 2015 EYE Retreat have not been finalized. Marian. Hall, 86, passed away Friday November 14, 2014. She was born March 9, 1928 in Cumberland County, NC the daughter of the late A. F. Barrett and Lula (Cameron) Barrett. She was a graduate

of Flora McDonald College. Mrs. Hall taught at the Governor Morehead School f/t Blind in Raleigh NC until she retired.

Mrs. Sandra Harrison passed away September 12, 2014. She taught at the Governor Morehead School f/t Blind Raleigh, NC until she retired.

Lois Dickson Moffett of Sanford, NC, went into eternal glory on August 22, 2014. Born July 22, 1923, in Arlington, NJ, she spent childhood with her beloved parents, brother, close cousins, and extended family. In June 1944 just before graduating from the NJ State Teachers' College, she met the love of her life, Chaplain Polk Moffett, Lieut. J.G., when her college choir sang at the Coast Guard Barracks' Sunday service. They were married Nov. 22, 1944, and the following spring, Polk left to serve overseas. From 1946-1959, Lois and Polk welcomed five beautiful daughters and served in churches in Blackstone, VA,

Dallas and Greenville, TX, and Duncan, OK. In 1964, they moved to Raleigh, NC, and became a part of White Memorial Presbyterian Church. Lois then began an eighteen-year teaching career at Gov. Morehead School for the Visually Impaired. Lois was active in many groups, including the NCSU Civic Symphony Orchestra (violin section, 20 years), co-founder of the History and Archives Board for the GMS Archives Museum, Priv. John Grady Chapter of D.A.R., Sir Walter Lioness Club, Delta Kappa Gama Society (Omicron Chapter), Keenagers Ministry at White Memorial, and women's prison outreach ministry. Lois was an avid gardener, talented artist in porcelain painting, knitting, ceramics, water color, and oil painting, and an accomplished musician, playing the Violin, piano, bugle, mandolin, and dulcimer, and teaching piano too many of her grandchildren and others. Lois will best be remembered for her strong

faith, zest for living, boundless energy, and steadfast love and grace.
